PRESIDENT

Dr. Bob Kustra is in his eighth year as president of the largest public university in Idaho. He has led the university during a period of dynamic growth in student enrollment, new construction, fundraising and research.



His tenure has been marked by an emphasis on research, upgrading standards for admission, improving the undergraduate experience, and increasing the number of graduate and doctoral programs. Since 2003 faculty awards and grants for research at Boise State have nearly tripled to \$50 million. Dr. Kustra also advocated successfully for Boise State's inclusion in the Mountain West Conference, beginning in 2011.
